

## **History 1112: World History since 1500    Fall 2017    100% Online Course**

### Course Objectives

This semester, we will explore the major social, cultural, political, and economic themes in World history from 1500 to the Present. Special attention will be devoted to the historical changes and problems of economic and social development on a global scale, particularly how this development (or lack thereof) affected and affects society, culture, the status of diverse peoples, and the distribution of wealth and resources at the global level.

This course is a 100% online course using CourseDen and your computer as the delivery medium. You are not required to attend class face to face. The midterm and final exams will both be taken online, and there will be no proctored exams for this course.

### Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate the ability to think historically through understanding of the political, social, economic, and cultural dimensions of world history; comprehension of causal relationships and patterns of change and continuity over time; or awareness of the social significance of ethnicity, gender, race, and class in historical events and study.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of the commonalities and differences among two or more societies, nations, or cultures outside of the United States in regard to any of the following: language, literature, aesthetics, politics, economics, or social and cultural practices.

## COURSE EVALUATION AND GRADE DISTRIBUTION

The course will be evaluated on a 10-pt scale: A=90-100; B=80-89; C=70-79; D=60-69; F=59-0.

Emphasis will be on clarity of ideas, reading, writing, analytical and critical thinking skills, class participation, and overall presentation. Participation in class discussions and lectures is encouraged and will form a component of the written assignment grades. There will be no extra credit offered in this class, so don't ask. Grade calculations are as follows:

- Exams 60%
- Reaction Papers 10%
- Quizzes 10%
- Class Participation 20%

### Exams

You will have **two essay exams** over the course of the term, with each exam constituting 30% of your final grade or a total of 60% combined. Late exams or exams submitted outside of the Exam Dropbox will not be accepted. If you miss an exam for properly documented reasons, you should make arrangements with me as soon as possible for a make-up exam. Failure to turn in that make-up exam within one week's time of it being scheduled will result in a 0. If you come to me at the end of the semester and have not made up an exam and request a make-up for a previously missed exam, the answer will be NO. More info on these exams will be given as we get closer to each exam.

### Reaction Papers

You will write **two creative writing papers** of 1-2 pages in length over the course of the semester, with each paper constituting 5% of your final grade or a total of 10% combined. Please see the Reaction Papers Module in CourseDen for more information on what is required of these papers. Late papers and/or emailed papers will not be accepted without a properly documented excuse.

### Class Participation

There are a total of **6 unit discussions** based on that unit's course material, with each discussion receiving a separate grade that will be applied towards your class participation grade. Grades received for your **mandatory introduction** and **student contract quiz** will also be counted

towards your class participation grade. Each Online Unit Discussion will be graded on a 25 point scale. Late posts will not be counted towards your unit discussion grades. See the Course Overview Module for more information on Class Participation Guidelines and Grading.

### Unit Quizzes

**Each unit has a 20 question quiz** based on that unit's materials. Each quiz is timed and will be counted as a combined 10% of your final grade. Late Unit Quizzes that exceed the time allotted or are taken after the Unit Quiz deadline will receive a grade of 0.

### A Note about Submitting Assignments to CourseDen

ASSIGNMENT FORMAT: All submitted assignments must be submitted in MS word format. Papers should be double-spaced and be written in size 12 Times New Roman font, black text, with 1" margins. Parenthetical references of (pg) are required for all paraphrased or directly quoted information. The usage of any source outside of CourseDen is not allowed.

SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS LATE OR OUTSIDE COURSEDEN: Late assignments submitted after the scheduled deadline or outside of the Assignments Dropbox will not be accepted unless you have a properly documented excuse. **Late assignments submitted without proper documentation will receive a 0. Please note that this rule is written in stone.**

THE RETURN OF GRADED WORK: Assignment grades will be posted within a week of the due date. Discussion grades will be posted within one week of the date of the discussion's end.

EXTRA CREDIT: There is no extra credit offered in this class outside of that stated on the syllabus or by the professor.

### IN THE EVENT OF TECHNICAL DIFFICULTIES
