

History 2111: American History to 1865 Fall 2019 100% Online Course

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Course Objectives

This semester, we will explore the major social, cultural, political, and economic themes in American history to 1865. Topics include but are not restricted to colonization, expansion, warfare, slavery and the slave trade, emancipation, immigration, gender, industrialization, and the changing role of the United States in foreign affairs. In order to examine American History from a well-rounded point of view, much of this class will take an Atlantic perspective in order to fully understand the peoples, events, and cultures that influenced and impacted this part of America's past. This course is a 100% online course using CourseDen and your computer as the delivery medium. You are not required to attend class face to face. The midterm and final exams will both be taken online, and there will be no proctored exams for this course.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of this course, students will be expected to:

- ❖ Identify and explain the political, social, economic, or cultural dimensions of US history.
- ❖ Interpret primary and/or secondary sources.
- ❖ Develop critical thinking skills

Students who do not fulfill these requirements, which can be found in the in the Start Here: Syllabus and Start Items Module, will be dropped for non-participation. If you are unable to complete these assignments in the allotted time-frame and have documentation to that effect, you should contact me as soon as possible to avoid being dropped after the deadline. Please note UWG's policy on attendance verification as outlined in Section 204 of the UWG Faculty Handbook: "In fully online or hybrid courses each instructor has the authority to specify in the syllabus what qualifies as attendance at the first class meeting and during the Drop/Add Period to drop students who fail to meet that requirement. COURSE EVALUATION AND GRADE DISTRIBUTION

The course will be evaluated on a 10-pt scale: A=90-100; B=80-89; C=70-79; D=60-69; F=59-0.

Emphasis will be on clarity of ideas, reading, writing, analytical and critical thinking skills, class participation, and overall presentation. Participation in class discussions and lectures is encouraged and will form a component of the written assignment grades. Grade calculations are as follows:

- Exams 20%
- Reaction Papers 10%
- Quizzes 50%
- Class Participation 20%

Exams

You will have **two essay exams, a Midterm and a Final**, with the exams constituting 20% of your final. Late exams and/or exams submitted outside of the Exam Dropbox will not be accepted. If you miss the exam for properly documented reasons, you should make arrangements with me as soon as possible for a make-up exam. Failure to turn in that make-up exam by the arranged deadline will result in a 0. See CourseDen for more information on these exams. There are no proctored exams in this class.

Reaction Papers

You will write **two short papers** of 1-2 pages in length over the course of the semester, with each paper constituting 5% of your final grade or a total of 10% combined. This is a **creative writing exercise** that asks you to put yourself in the material and imagine what it would be like to live during this period. You can do this through a variety of ways and I've given you some suggestions on how to do that in the guidelines that are posted in the respective unit activities folder and the Reaction Papers Module. Please see the Reaction Papers Module in CourseDen for more information on what is required of these papers. Late papers and/or emailed papers will not be accepted without a properly documented excuse.

Class Participation

There are a total of **8 unit discussions** based on that unit's course material, with each discussion receiving a separate grade that will be applied towards your class participation grade. Grades received for your **mandatory introduction, student contract quiz, and plagiarism quiz** will also be counted towards your class participation grade. Each Online Unit Discussion will be graded on a 25-point scale, with the grading rubric posted in CourseDen. Late posts will not be counted towards your unit discussion grades. Unit Quizzes

Each unit has a 20-question quiz based on that unit's materials. Each quiz is timed to 50 minutes with a 5-minute grace period, and your quizzes count as a combined 50% of your final grade. Quizzes that exceed the time allotted or are taken after the deadline will receive a 0.

A Note about Submitting Assignments to CourseDen

ASSIGNMENT FORMAT: All submitted assignments must be submitted in MS word format. Papers should be double-spaced and be written in size 12 Times New Roman font, black text, with 1" margins. Parenthetical references of (pg) or (Author, pg) are required for all paraphrased or directly quoted information. The usage of any source outside of CourseDen is prohibited, and assignments containing information taken from outside sources will be graded accordingly. Essays that do not contain in text citations will also be graded accordingly.

SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS LATE OR OUTSIDE COURSEDEN: Late assignments submitted after the scheduled deadline or outside of the Assignments Dropbox will not be accepted unless you have a properly documented excuse. **Late assignments submitted without proper documentation will receive a 0. Please note that this rule is written in stone.**

THE RETURN OF GRADED WORK: Assignments and discussions will be graded within the week.

IN THE EVENT OF TECHNICAL DIFFICULTIES

It is **your responsibility** to see that your assignments have posted to CourseDen properly. Please check to make sure that your assignment was uploaded correctly and appears in the appropriate Assignment Dropbox. **It is your responsibility to confirm that your assignments have been submitted properly to the Assignment Dropbox.**

A Note about Academic Honesty:

I will not tolerate cheating, plagiarism, or any other form of academic dishonesty in this class and my policy is one of zero tolerance. All assignments and discussion posts submitted in class must be written in your own words. This includes paraphrasing, which may not be taking a passage word for word, but certainly does not give credit to ideas and/or information. **All assignments will be monitored by Turnitin**, and plagiarizers will automatically fail the course. I will also recommend that UWG administration take action. Plagiarism is a serious offense and it can lead to your expulsion and/or suspension from the University. Every UWG student agrees

upon their admission to the university to uphold the UWG Honor Code, which states: “[a]s a West Georgia student, I will represent myself truthfully and complete all academic assignments honestly.
