COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended to introduce students to the practice of history. It is designed to help students succeed as history majors at the University of West Georgia. We will focus on developing the skills necessary to think and work like historians, but we will also take into consideration the skills needed to teach history as well. We will also sample the varieties of sources in writing history and the varieties of history. This is a required course for all history majors. In order to graduate, history majors must earn a C or better in this course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

This class is designed to help students learn what historians do and why they do it. In addition, the class is designed to help students develop the skills necessary to succeed as history majors. Those skills include the ability:

- to recognize and to pose significant historical questions
- to find useful primary and secondary sources
- to analyze sources critically
- to cite sources properly
- to write and to speak clearly
- to construct a persuasive historical argument based on evidence; and
- to think historically

*Thinking historically requires one:

- to seek to understand the people of the past
- to seek to understand the perspective of historical actors and to view those historical actors from a critical, scholarly perspective
- to recognize that people, events, ideas and cultures have influenced later people, events, ideas, and cultures
- to recognize that history involves both change and continuity over time and to
- to draw and explain connections between particular people, events, ideas, or texts and their historical contexts

ASSIGNMENTS AND ASSESSMENT

Exams: There will be one graded exam – a final exam – that will take place online during the final week of the semester. We will discuss this exam at greater length in our final Face2Face meeting of the course. The exam will take place over several days, and it must be taken during the final week. A make-up exam will be considered only in the most extreme emergency, which must be documented (no documentation means no make-up). Failure to complete the final exam will result in a “0” for the exam.

Book Review: You will write a 4-5 page analysis of *Confederates in the Attic*. See the Book Review Guidelines in the Assignment Guidelines Section for details. We will also discuss this in class. In preparation for your review, read Chapters 4 and 5 of Kate Turabian's *Manual*.

Book Review Rewrite: Just like it sounds. You will revise and resubmit your book review. In preparation for writing your revised draft, read chapters 9, 11, and 12 of Kate Turabian's *Manual*.

Primary Source Analysis: You will write a 2-3 page paper that analyzes a primary source of your choosing from any database found online on the Ingram Library Website. You can find a link for that website in the Resources Tab in the top right hand corner of the screen. Additional instructions will be provided on CourseDen, and they can be found in the Assignments Guidelines Section. In preparation for your review, read Chapters 5-7 of Kate Turabian's *Manual*.

Quizzes: You will take three quizzes over the course of the semester that will test your ability to write effectively. They will cover important matters of organization, grammar, usage, punctuation, spelling, and conformity with proper citation format. These quizzes will take place online. In preparation for these quizzes, read Parts II and III of Kate Turabian's *Manual*.

Online and Research Assignments: You will also undertake several research assignments throughout the semester, with some being simple assignments of finding historical photographs or a useful website, to writing short analyses, to writing opinion pieces on things discussed or viewed in class. Please see the course schedule for each assignment and their respective due dates. The

majority of these will be done independently, and you will discuss them in the online Discussion Forums. If there is one that is to be discussed in a Face2Face meeting, it will be marked as such.

Class Participation: 25% total

There will be in-class discussions on assigned books and primary sources. We will be reading all of the books from the above assigned reading list in addition to articles and primary sources. Your discussion grade is based on how frequently you contribute AND how insightful your comments are. The more you contribute insightful comments, the better your grade – effort is the key! **Any class participation must stay on topic, unless it relates directly to the subject at hand.** Comments to the contrary will be classified as disruptive, and you will be asked to refrain from making comments such as these in the future. If it continues, you will be asked to leave class.

F2F Class participation is 10% of your grade and will be graded as follows:

100: Substantial comments every class, outstanding participation

90: Participate regularly in the class discussion, but not every class meeting

85: Participate occasionally, with worthwhile insight and good questions

80: Commented once or twice over the course of the semester

70: no comments made

ONLINE DISCUSSIONS

Since this is a partially online course, the majority of our time will be spent online. Just as your in-class discussion grade, your online discussion grade is based on how frequently you contribute as well as how insightful your comments are. Discussion activity assignments are community discussions about specific topics that include individual postings made by you and responses to other student postings. Postings should relate directly to the topic. **Discussion postings have two deadlines: one for the initial posting and one for your response posting.** Please make sure that you plan accordingly. Additional details will be provided in each assignment, so see the Discussion Forums for details.

Online class discussions will be a combined 15% of your grade and will be graded follows:

90: completed assignment as described with no additional comments

80: completed majority of the assignment but did not complete it 100%

70: attempted 50% of the assignment

60: posted initial comment but did not comment on classmates' posts

0: did not attempt assignment

You will receive one additional point for every comment made beyond the assignment requirements. Comments made after posting deadlines will not be counted, and comments not fulfilling comment requirements will not be counted either. While you are expected to speak up in class (either online or F2F) and ask questions, as well as actively participate in online discussions, you are also expected to respect your fellow students' opinions and time. I will not tolerate disrespect of any kind, and you will be asked to leave. If disruptive behavior continues, you will be removed from the course. So play nice.

A Note about Submitting Assignments to CourseDen

ASSIGNMENT FORMAT

All submitted assignments will have the following format:

- MS Word, Standard 1" margins, double-spaced text, with NO double-spacing between paragraphs, using size 12 font, Times New Roman, black text
- No cover pages. Just put your name on it and we are good.
- Please note that images do not count towards paper length.
- Citations should follow the Chicago Manual of Style Format. Kate Turabian's *Manual* is also accepted. You can use endnotes or footnotes, although footnotes are preferred. There are no exceptions, and *assignments that are not cited in the CMS format will receive a 10 point penalty for failure to adhere to assignment submission guidelines* (unless assignment guidelines allow for parenthetical references).

SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS LATE OR OUTSIDE COURSE DEN

I will not accept assignments by email, so please do not send them to me there unless you have received permission from me to do so. Late assignments submitted after the due date will not be accepted unless you have a properly documented excuse. Late assignments submitted without proper documentation will receive a 0. Please note that this rule is absolute. You have known about these assignments all semester, and have had plenty of time to complete them and upload them into their corresponding dropbox. Unless you have a properly documented excuse, there is no reason why you cannot get your work in on time.

THE RETURN OF GRADED WORK: All written assignment grades will be posted within one week of the due date. Discussion grades will be posted within one month of the discussion's completion.

EXTRA CREDIT: There is no extra credit offered in this class.

IN THE EVENT OF TECHNICAL DIFFICULTIES

It is **your responsibility** to see that your assignments have posted to CourseDen properly. Please check to make sure that your assignment was uploaded correctly and appears in the appropriate Dropbox. If it does not appear, I cannot grade it, and I will not be asking you where it is. Instead, I will assume that you did not do the assignment on time and will grade your assignment accordingly. In other words, your assignment will be considered late once the submission deadline has passed. Please make sure that your link works properly, because I will not be contacting you to resubmit a working link.

In the event that you are having computer/wifi difficulties, please find an alternative source. **Do not wait until the last minute to submit assignments.** You are submitting items over the Internet, and sometimes the Internet Gods get angry and withhold access. There are many things that can go wrong in the path between your computer and CourseDen. Technical problems related to computer connections or equipment cannot be used as an excuse for failure to complete assignments or to participate online.

It is your responsibility to locate the computer hardware, software and Internet connections necessary to stay connected and current with your course work online. I will not tolerate cheating, plagiarism, or any other form of academic dishonesty in this class, and **any student found guilty of plagiarism will automatically receive a failing grade for the course.** Any assignments given in class must be written in your own words, and will not consist of information found on the internet or from any outside source unless cited. This includes paraphrasing, which may not be taking a passage word for word, but certainly does not give credit to ideas and/or information.

All assignments will be turned into CourseDen and will be monitored by the Turnitin.com feature in CourseDen, which gives me the percentage of the paper that has been plagiarized as well as from where the offending passage was taken. If you plagiarize, you will automatically fail the course. Your name will be forwarded to through the appropriate channels, and I will recommend that UWG administration take action. Plagiarism is a serious offense and it can lead to your expulsion and/or suspension from the University. **In short, don't do it.** See CourseDen for details on what constitutes plagiarism and how to avoid it in the Content Module.
