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Course Objectives

This course is an introduction to the history and civilization of Latin America from Pre-Columbian times until Independence and assumes no prior knowledge of the area. We will discuss the creation of new societies by Native American, African, and European peoples and examine the political, cultural, and economic forces which have conditioned the development of institutions and ideas in Spanish and Portuguese America.

This course is designed to help you appreciate the multicultural nature of the world we live in. You will be introduced to important concepts, ideas, and events that will allow you understand the origins of the Latin Americans, our nearest neighbors and our largest minority group. In addition, you will be able to improve your geographical awareness, your understanding of historiography, and the skills of writing, analysis, and critical thinking that all of your other important endeavors will require.

Course Requirements

Students will be expected to keep up with the reading. Because of the large amount of material to be covered, class attendance is absolutely essential if you hope to get a good grade. Attendance will be taken, but is not mandatory.

I reserve the right to make changes to this syllabus. It is your responsibility to attend class so that you may be aware of any changes.

Grading

There will be two written examinations: a midterm worth 20% of the final grade, and a final worth 20%. You will have two written assignments based on the Restall and Cope books, each worth 15% of the final grade. You will write one historiographical analysis based on scholarly articles or book chapters worth 15% (the topic of which will be announced in class). Two map quizzes and a film review will count for a total of 15%.

Your exam dates are noted on this syllabus, and you will be informed of quiz dates ahead of time. Do not make travel plans that conflict with your exam dates.

Academic Honesty

You are expected to be familiar with and abide by the university's policies on academic honesty. As a West Georgia student, you have pledged not to lie, cheat, steal, or commit plagiarism. It is equally wrong to give aid as it is to receive it. When copying word for word from another source, you must use quotation marks and cite your source.
